



The Center for Multicultural Affairs and the State University of New York at Fredonia are honored to hold the 27th annual Rosa Parks Scholarship Contest. Students who enter have a chance to be awarded \$350.00. This scholarship will be rewarded to the top three entries, as chosen by our judges.

What: All submissions are accompanied by an entry form (complete upon submission). all entries must include a typed statement reflecting the content of the work. The work must focus on multiculturalism or social justice. Written submissions must be double spaced, typewritten and must not exceed 10 paged. All 2D/3D work must be submitted in its original form to the Center for Multicultural Affairs. Any performance or multimedia presentations must be submitted electronically on video and must not exceed 10 minutes. All entrants' must agree to have their names publicly displayed.

The Story of Claudette Colvin

When we discuss the Civil Rights movement, there are those names which

are practically synonymous with the era. Heroes such as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and Rosa Parks. While it is essential to never forget such individuals, there are those who deserve equal recognition, but who it seems history may have overlooked. One such individual being Claudette Colvin.

It is fairly certain that Claudette Colvin was actually the first person to ever stand up against segregation law. What is even more heroic is that she did so at the age of 15. On March 2nd 1955, Claudette Colvin refused to give up her seat while riding the

bus home from school. When asked about the situation, Ms. Colvin vividly remembers the day and that she was inspired by what she was learning about her own roots in school. There were certain aspects of the era that were especially frustrating to a girl growing up in that era, Colvin notes, "not being allowed to try on clothes in department






stores" she goes on to point out how cruel it is to treat anyone that way, especially young people who are in the process of forming their identity (Adler, Web).

At the time, Civil Rights leaders made the choice to overlook Claudette Colvin, due to Rosa Parks having a more desirable political image for the movement. Her family was forced to fend for themselves, and even had to move due to the public backlash. This makes Colvin all the more a heroine as she took the brunt of a inhumane era. Claudette's story should be spread as one for young people, as young leaders are not a fiction.
