During this Spring semester students continue to put forth great effort in performing a variety of volunteer and community service activities throughout the local area and beyond. Due to the devastation of Hurricane Maria, Fredonia student volunteers are assisting with the Hurricane Relief efforts to help families that have been displaced by this horrific disaster.

Many of our students, which included individual volunteers and student groups as well as athletes accomplished an array of tasks. Student volunteers will again participate in the twelfth annual Relay for Life event, a walk to benefit the American Cancer Society. It offers everyone in the community as well as students an opportunity to participate in the fight against cancer. Last year over four hundred and fifty students participated in this important endeavor. Students will partake in the Adopt-A-Beach Clean-up to enhance the beaches of the

Great Lakes during Earth Month.

Fredonia student volunteers have been involved in cooking and serving meals to impoverished families at the local friendly kitchen; collected and helped to distribute winter clothing to area families in need. Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia has been taking the time to perform songs at various nursing homes improving the quality of life for seniors and continues to do so. Student volunteers have been assisting local youth through mentoring along with many other service activities.

Our students have shown care and compassion to those who were in the greatest need by helping families through Habitat for Humanity by rehabbing and helping to build affordable housing. Student groups will join a variety of volunteers in the streets of Fredonia for the annual Buffalo News Kids Day which helps to raise funds for Women and Children's Hospital of Buffalo.
