2022–2023 New York State Budget

I want to thank everyone who has engaged in advocacy efforts for SUNY. Over the course of the last few weeks, several people have touched base with my office to discuss their advocacy work regarding the fiscal year 2022-23 budget priorities. As you have likely seen, this work has made a tremendous impact as the New York State budget for the SUNY system was very favorable for all of our students and campuses. Thank you.

During the next few weeks, we will be determining the direct impact of the SUNYappropriated budget on SUNY Fredonia. I am optimistic that the impact on our campus budget will be significant. While this news is welcome, we need to continue to work diligently towards increasing enrollment and retention and enhancing operational efficiency.

Also related to budgets, each of our Vice Presidents is currently working to propose a fiscal year 2022-23 budget for their respective division. Given our realities, I have encouraged them to utilize a modified zero-based budget approach in developing their proposals.

New Chief Information Officer

I am very pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. Jerry DeSanto as the Interim Chief Information Officer for SUNY Fredonia. This interim appointment, effective June 3, 2022, is intended to last up to two calendar years.

Dr. DeSanto comes to us from The Registry and is currently completing an appointment as Interim CIO for the Nebraska State College System. Dr. DeSanto has held other CIO appointments at Illinois Wesleyan University and The University of Scranton. He also previously served as Executive Vice President at John Carroll University with an extensive portfolio including Information Technology.

Dr. DeSanto received his undergraduate degree and M.B.A. in Management and Finance from The University of Scranton, and his Ed.D. in Higher Education Management from the University of Pennsylvania. His dissertation focused on the role of the higher education CIO amidst changing IT industry forces.

Among the things that Dr. DeSanto will help our institution to achieve during his tenure are the following:

- 1. Prioritizing IT institutional needs while addressing staffing requirements;
- 2. Enhancing a positive user experience;
- 3. Centralizing IT staff physically and organizationally;
- 4. Collaborating with various offices on campus to ensure streamlining of workflows and effective use of data for compliance and accreditation;
- 5. Optimizing the usage of non-paper processes in our business transactions;
- 6. Contributing toward the strategic planning process to ensure that IT is positioned as a foundational elements of our new strategic plan;
- 7. Expanding nontraditional students' access via IT to programs at the university;
- 8. Improving efficiency and effectiveness of business processes through increased employment of IT;
- 9. Transitioning from homegrown systems to appropriate enterprise systems; and
- Assisting our efforts to conduct a national search for a long-term CIO.

I feel confident that Dr. DeSanto will bring the background and depth of experience necessary to make him successful in his new role. He will be a member of the President's Cabinet and will report directly to me. I hope you will join me in extending a warm welcome to Dr. DeSanto when he arrives in June.

Visits Across Campus

Early this month, I had the opportunity to visit Fredonia's herbarium in the Science Center and to learn about the outstanding service of a community volunteer, Pat Appelbe. The herbarium, as you may be aware, is a place where plant material is identified, preserved, and cataloged for research and other scientific purposes. Among their many uses, herbaria play an important role in studies pertaining to plant succession and the impacts of climate change on vegetation. Fredonia's herbarium has been a valuable resource to researchers worldwide.

For more than a decade, Pat has offered her service on a volunteer basis to ensure that the herbarium remains a vital part of the learning experience for our students at SUNY Fredonia. She continues to help build the collection and support students to achieve their learning goals.
