The EDP staff applied for and received a grant from SUNY Fredonia's Faculty Student Association to fund the EDP Cultural Connections Project. In honor of this milestone, the Office of Opportunity Programs (OOP) in Albany is planning a celebratory dinner on November 2. OOP is located at SUNY Central and oversees all the EOP programs. The Educational Opportunity Program combines access, academic support and supplemental financial assistance to make higher education possible for students who have the potential to succeed, despite poor preparation and limited financial resources.

The Educational Opportunity Program had its origins in the late 1960's during the Rockefeller Administration. The Master Plan of the State University for 1964 set forth a long-range commitment that "every student capable of completing a program of higher education shall have the opportunity to do so." This objective was reaffirmed in the 2002-04 Master Plan which states: "As a public institution, the University has a strong commitment to ensuring broad access and opportunity for New York State residents." That commitment was reaffirmed in Mission Review.

In 1967, then first-year Assemblyman, Arthur O. Eve, of the 141st Assembly District in Buffalo, gave further force to the principles of access and opportunity by developing the appropriation bill that gave birth to the Educational Opportunity Program. Modeled on the SEEK (Search for Education, Elevation and Knowledge) program that had been instituted by Percy Sutton in the City University of New York in the prior year, the first unit of what would become a university-wide opportunity program enrolled 249 students at the State University College in Buffalo. In the following year, Assemblyman Eve

was able to obtain sufficient funding to permit expansion to ten campuses. By the 1970-71 academic year, thirty campuses had enrolled more than 4,600 opportunity students and New York State Education Law §6452 had formally established the provisions of SEEK at the City University of New York, the Educational Opportunity Program in the State University of New York and the Higher Educational Opportunity Program at the independent colleges in New York.

The Educational Opportunity Program now exists on forty-five campuses in the University. Similar programs offer opportunities in the higher education systems of New Jersey, Pennsylvania and California. Today, graduates number more than 47,000. Most continue to live in New York, enriching its economic and social fabric. Among their number are physicians, teachers, scientists, engineers, attorneys, artists, entrepreneurs and public servants. And, many have returned to the University as administrators and counselors who provide support to another generation of opportunity students. As of spring 2007, over 1,880 students were admitted through Fredonia's EDP and over 650 have graduated.

EOP officially started at Fredonia in 1970. Dr. Jeffrey J. Wallace, EDP director from 1972 – 1981, renamed the Educational **Opportunity** Program to Educational **Development** Program "to emphasize the developmental process that students go through to become successful, contributing citizens in society. Opportunity allows access but what a college does with and for students is the development nature of education."

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION COURSES OFFERED

Each semester EDP offers **Supplemental Instruction (SI)** courses for its students. These SI classes help EDP students develop analytical and quantitative abilities and problem solving, communication, study, and test taking skills necessary to successfully master course material. SI courses are linked to College Core Curriculum courses and expose college freshman to introductory courses in a variety of academic fields. Courses are credit bearing and taught in a small group setting by the parent course instructor. Research has found this environment conducive for learning and retention of course material and encourages student participation in classes. Biology Study Skills, taught by **Dr. Bruce Tomlinson**, and Survey of Pre-calculus lab, taught by **Ms. Kristen Franklin**, were offered for the fall. Also offered was a grammar/writing workshop taught by **Mr. Christopher Vogt.** Biology Study Skills and Survey of Calculus lab will be offered for the spring.

TUTORING SERVICES AVAILABLE

EDP tutoring services are well underway for the fall 2007 semester. If any EDP students are having difficulties in a course, or wish to have a better understanding of course material, they may sign up for one-on-one assigned tutoring in EDP or drop-in tutoring in the Learning Center with a peer tutor. Tutors come to EDP from the College Tutoring Service (CTS). CTS held a day-long orientation for all tutors at the College Lodge on September 8. Tutoring should not be held off until the last minute. EDP FRESHMAN SUMMER ORIENTATION

One of the largest entering classes in EDP's history is the result of a new recruitment initiative started by Mr. Daniel Tramuta, Associate Vice President for Enrollment Service/EDP Supervisor. Because of the efforts of the Admissions and EDP

staff, 58 first-time freshmen and 4 transfer students were welcomed to campus. This was 100% participation from those students who confirmed they were coming.

This year's freshmen had the opportunity to come to a SOAP (Summer Orientation Advising Program) in June or July as well as the special EDP orientation immediately before the semester started in August. During the SOAP two-day orientation, freshmen became familiar with the campus and were able to select their fall courses. During the more intensive three-day workshop, students took part in various sessions that covered leadership, the history of EOP, classroom behavior, achieving academic success, and good decision making.
