From The Director

Greetings!

It is with great enthusiasm that I address our new freshmen; returning EDP students; EDP alumni; and the friends, families, and supporters of the Educational Development Program.

Let me begin by sharing this year's EDP theme: *Excellence without Excuses*. EDP students and staff have embraced the mindset of having a plan of action, utilizing the available resources, staying focused, eliminating negative habits, having the willingness and desire to be successful, and knowing that there is nothing to prevent all of us from achieving our desired level of excellence.

As we continue building on our successes and addressing areas of concern, I am confident that our students will reach increased levels of achievement. To that end, this past summer 21 talented freshmen successfully completed the July EDP Workshop for Expanded Learning (JEWEL). Students participated in rigorous academic preparation designed to assist them in identifying expectations, increasing

their familiarity with SUNY Fredonia, strengthening their work ethic, and building the confidence and skills necessary to be successful on our campus.

TUTORING SERVICES AVAILABLE

EDP tutoring services have been extremely busy for the fall 2011 semester. If any EDP students are having difficulties in a course, or wish to have a better understanding of course material, they may sign up

for one-on-one assigned tutoring in EDP or meet with a peer tutor during drop-in tutoring hours in the Learning Center. Tutors are available to EDP from the College Tutoring Services (CTS), which held a day-long orientation for all tutors at the College Lodge on August 27. Tutoring should not be held off until the last minute. Students should contact their EDP counselor and fill out a tutee application or go to the Learning Center on the 4th floor of Reed Library for tutoring assistance.

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION

Each semester EDP offers Supplemental Instruction (SI) courses for its students. These SI classes help EDP students develop analytical, quantitative, and problem solving abilities and communication, study, and test taking skills necessary to successfully master course material. SI courses are linked to College Core Curriculum courses and expose college freshmen to introductory courses in a variety of academic fields. Courses are credit bearing and taught in a small group setting by the parent course instructor. Research has found this environment conducive for learning and retention of course material and encourages student participation in classes.

Biology Study Skills, taught by <u>Dr. Bruce Tomlinson</u>, was offered for the fall. Biology Study Skills and Survey of Calculus lab will be offered for the spring.

30th ANNUAL EDP AWARDS **CEREMONY TO BE HELD MARCH 21, 2012**

The Educational Development Program will host its 30th Annual Awards Ceremony on Wednesday, March 21, 2012, in the Horizon Room of the Williams Center at 4 p.m. Faculty, staff, parents, alumni, and students are encouraged to attend this annual event. The ceremony is an opportunity for EDP to recognize EDP students' academic achievements. EDP students who earned a minimum grade point average of 2.7 while completing 12 credits or more for the S'11 and/or F'11 semesters will receive certificates. Silver certificates will be presented to students with a 2.70-3.29 GPA and gold certificates will be presented to students with a 3.30-4.00 GPA. 2012 EDP RECRUITMENT

For the third consecutive year fall EDP admissions were closed in early May. EDP's recruitment initiatives begin in November with the EDP staff sending acknowledgment packets to each of our applicants and will continue while students submit the necessary documentation and ultimately pay their deposits. EDP admission is closed once our target enrollment is reached.

The EDP staff has begun working on enrolling our fall 2012 class. We urge all applicants to call with any questions or concerns regarding our EDP admission requirements.



Seating for the 2012 freshman class is limited and it is essential that all required documentation be submitted as soon as possible.

All applicants will receive a letter and packet of information, including a <u>yellow postcard</u>, from EDP. In order to continue the application process, applicants <u>MUST</u> return the yellow postage paid card to us within two weeks of receiving it.

Once the yellow postcard is returned to Admissions, applicants will receive a letter from the Admissions Office requesting additional information to complete the application. Please forward the items listed as soon as possible to SUNY Fredonia's Admissions Office, Fenner House, 178 Central Avenue, Fredonia, NY 14063. Items needed to complete an application are:

- ♦ high school transcript or GED
- ◆ Eligibility Information Form PDF (81kb)
- ◆ SAT and/or ACT test scores
- personal interview with EDP director
- two letters of recommendation (e.g., from a guidance counselor, teacher, club leader, employer, etc.)
- autobiographical essay (tell us about your life circumstances which you feel make you a good candidate for EDP)
- income verification (e.g., **signed** copies of the **2011 federal** parents' taxes and student's taxes (if filed) including W -2 forms). If taxes are not filed, then you will need to submit a social security statement, social services statement, etc. See Question #8 on the Eligibility Information Form for more details.

SECOND WALLACE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED

The second Wallace Scholarship was presented to **Ms. Pilar Nelson** in September, pictured here with EDP Director David White. Ms. Nelson is a junior Psychology major from Buffalo. She was recognized for this honor at the Fredonia College Foundation's Scholars' Breakfast October 1.

Pilar has been a member of the Black Student Union and Sister Circle; a Student Ambassador, EDP peer advisor and study hall monitor, resident hall night desk attendant and social chair; and Leadership Resource Center intern.

Criteria for the scholarship are for EDP students to have earned a minimum of 50 credit hours, must be enrolled at Fredonia at least one semester after receiving the scholarship, must be in good academic standing (minimum 2.50 CUM GPA), and must have evidence of campus and program leadership. A 500-600 word essay is required which is to include a description of successes and challenges while at Fredonia and how EDP has been instrumental in achieving such goals. The EDP staff recommends students to the scholarship committee consisting of Emma McFayden '76, Keith McFayden '77, Dr. Sherryl Weems '76, Dr. Jawaan Wallace, and Dr. Jeffrey J. Wallace '68. The EDP staff will select the next set of nominees in March 2012 with the scholarship being presented in September 2012.

EDP ALUMNI SPEAKER SERIES

The **EDP Alumni Speaker Series** provides a platform for EDP graduates to motivate and inspire students from a program and campus that have had a significant impact on shaping their lives. In addition to providing a means for current EDP students and other members of our campus community to interact with our EDP alumni, the event serves the purpose of highlighting the important work and success stories of our EDP alumni in varying fields. These special individuals continue to epitomize what it means to go "Above and Beyond." The fall 2011 <u>EDP Alumni Speaker</u> was **Dr. Sherryl D. Weems** '76/Education.

Using EDP's '11-'12 theme of *Excellence Without Excuses* as her presentation topic, Dr. Weems urged students to get rid of excuses on their journey to graduation, to be honest, and to know the difference between excuses and circumstances. "The calendar is your friend. You know when mid-semester is coming up. Excellence cannot be achieved if you rely on excuses. The most dangerous combination of words is 'should

have and can't' and don't use coulda, woulda, shoulda to explain away failure. Keep your eye on the prize and side step the excuses. Being a student is your full-time job so concentrate on getting OUT and utilizing resources. Remove yourself from people who make excuses." She also said that "someone is watching you. Your success will determine their next step."

Dr. Weems received her bachelor of arts degree in Education/Spanish Concentration from the State University of New York at Fredonia '76; master of science degree in Education/Reading Specialist and doctorate in Education/Administration and Curriculum Planning from SUNY Buffalo; and a master of arts degree in Theology from Northeastern Seminary, Rochester, New York. She also completed the Harvard Graduate School of Education Institute for Higher Education Certification Program in Management Development.

Dr. Weems recently retired as Associate Vice-Provost for Continuing and Professional Studies and Executive Director of the Educational Opportunity Center at the University at Buffalo. In this dual administrative capacity, she had the oversight responsibility for creating access and opportunity for adult students (traditional and non-traditional) who seek formal education experiences, job training and workforce preparation on a variety of levels and in multiple capacities. Combined, these programs offer a unique response to degree and professional certificate seeking adults, adults in need of basic academic literacy, English as a Second Language, pre-college preparation, job preparation and specific job skill training. Assistance is also given to employers who have a commitment to improving workforce access, affording op-

portunities for training, and sustaining pipeline development.

She also served as an adjunct faculty member in the Graduate School of Education at SUNY Buffalo, concentrating her teaching emphasis on introducing undergraduate/graduate students to the profession of teaching through various course sequences. Dr. Weems worked with a number of campus committees, community organizations, local employers, and educational organizations to promote and create opportunities for literacy, continuing and professional education, and economic and workforce development throughout the region. She has held board positions on a number of community service agencies and educational and workforce development entities.

She was one of the founding members of Buffalo Prep, a member of Leadership Buffalo, and currently serves on the <u>Alumni Board</u> of the State University of New York at Fredonia. In addition, she is appointed as a board director for the King Center Charter School in Buffalo, and she was most recently asked to serve on the Mayor's "Pathways Out of Poverty" Planning Board for the City of Buffalo.

We wish Dr. Weems well as she starts a new chapter in her career as provost at <u>Victory University</u>, a Christian, liberal arts college, in Memphis, Tennessee.

STUDY HALL PROGRAM

Mandatory study hall is one part of EDP's student support services to provide a structured study time for first-semester freshmen, students currently on academic probation, and those nearing academic risk. Students may complete their study hall hours in the EDP computer lab (pictured below) during the day or during evening hours in other classrooms. Upperclass EDP students monitor the evening study halls.

"These study sessions provide our students with the opportunity to complete homework assignments, write papers, and prepare for exams in an environment that is



free of distractions and conducive to improving their academic standing. Regardless of whether students are required to attend, we encourage all of our students to take advantage of study hall," said EDP Director David White. "This is the second semester we are doing this and we have found that students are adjusting well and seeing the benefits of having this structured system of studying and how it reflects in their grades."
