Claudette Sorel and The Sorel Organization

Claudette Sorel (1932–1999) was an accomplished pianist, world-class performer, and music educator. Her career touched the lives of many with more than 2,000 concert, recital, and festival appearances, and performances with more than 200 orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic, Boston Symphony, Philadelphia Orchestra, London Symphony, and NBC Symphony. She held a professorship at the State University of New York at Fredonia, where she was head of the piano area for 13 years. In 1969, Claudette Sorel was designated by the State University of New York Board of Trustees as the youngest and first woman "Distinguished University Professor," among a faculty of 30,000.

Claudette Sorel's deep-rooted legacy with SUNY Fredonia continues to provide opportunities that celebrate the creativity and excellence of musicianship. She was a tireless advocate for the advancement of women and in 1996, she established the Elizabeth and Michel Sorel Charitable Organization, named in memory of her parents.

After her death in 1999, Sorel Trustees carried on her mission to expand opportunities and stretch the boundaries for women musicians in the fields of conducting, composition, film scoring, performance, arts leadership, technology, education, and scholarship. She was particularly interested in women composers and conductors, seeing these as measurable areas of change in gender equity.

Notable activities of The Sorel Organization (www.SorelMusic.org) include Sorel Medallions in Recording, the Sorel Classics label, the Sorel Choral Competition for women composers, the Claudette Sorel Piano Competition, composer residencies in the UK and USA, and multiple scholarships and commissions. When the Sorel Organization closed its doors at the end of 2024, it left a legacy of nine Claudette Sorel endowment funds at the New York Philharmonic, American Composers Forum, American Composers Orchestra, American Pianists Association, National Arts Club, New Music USA, New York University (film music scholarships), Voices of Ascension, and the State University of New York at Fredonia where Claudette Sorel taught for many years.

SOREL VISITING ARTIST: IENNIFER HIGDON

Jennifer Higdon, (b. Brooklyn, NY; New Year's Eve, 1962) makes her living solely from commissions and publishing. Her works represent a range of genres, from chamber to orchestral and wind ensemble, as well as vocal, choral and opera.

Higdon's list of commissioners is extensive and includes The Philadelphia Orchestra, The Chicago Symphony, The Cleveland Orchestra, and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, as well such groups as the Tokyo String Quartet, the Lark Quartet, Eighth Blackbird, and the President's Own United States Marine Band. She has also written works for such renowned artists as baritone Thomas Hampson and mezzo Sasha Cooke; pianists Yuja Wang and Gary Graffman; and violinists Joshua Bell, Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg, and Hilary Hahn. Her first opera, Cold Mountain, was commissioned by Santa Fe Opera, Opera Philadelphia, North Carolina Opera, and Minnesota Opera. It was awarded the prestigious International Opera Award for Best World Premiere in 2016; a suite from that opera was recently co-commissioned and performed by a group of 36 orchestras.

Upcoming premieres for the '24-25 season include a new opera for Pittsburgh Opera, a chamber work for the Icarus Quartet, and an orchestral work for the Chicago Youth Symphony.

Jennifer received the 2010 Pulitzer Prize in Music for her *Violin Concerto*. She is also a three-time Grammy-winner.

Her music has been hailed by Fanfare Magazine as having "the distinction of being at once complex, sophisticated but readily accessible emotionally", with the Times of London citing it as "...traditionally rooted yet imbued with integrity and freshness." The Chicago Sun Times recently cited her music as "both modern and timeless, complex and sophisticated, and immensely engaging in a way that both charms and galvanizes an audience craving something new and full of urgency, yet not distancing." John von Rhein of the Chicago Tribune called her writing, "beautiful, accessible, inventive, and impeccably crafted."

Higdon enjoys more than 250 performances annually of her works. Her orchestral work, *blue cathedral*, is one of the most performed contemporary orchestral pieces in the repertoire (having had more than 1,100 performances).

Jennifer's works have been recorded on more than 90 CDs. The Library of Congress has added the London Philharmonic recording of her Percussion Concerto to the National Recording Registry.

She was recently inducted into the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the American Philosophical Society (founded by Benjamin Franklin).

Faculty Biographies

excerpted bios, in alphabetical order

A member of the Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra, Grammy winner **Donna Dolson** has lived and played in ensembles in Japan, Norway, and Mexico. An extra player with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, she has played four of their last European tours; Manfred Honneck, conductor. Dolson recorded Bruckner Symphony #7 with the PSO (playing horn and Wagner Tuba), Elektra Symphonic Rhapsody, and Shostakovich Symphony #5, which won the Grammy Award for Best Orchestral Performance in 2018.

This year, Ms. Dolson produced a Masterclass tour given by her horn teacher and mentor, world renown Norwegian pedagogue Frøydis Ree Wekre. Classes were held at SUNY Fredonia, Cleveland Institute of Music, Carnegie Mellon University, and the Eastman School of Music.

Dr. Emily Schaad started her career on violin and viola, attending The Juilliard School and Curtis Institute of Music as a viola performance major. She holds an MA in Appalachian Studies from Appalachian State University and a DMA in Music Education at Boston University. At Fredonia, she serves as Director of Orchestral Activities at Fredonia School of Music (State University of New York) where she conducts the Symphony, Chamber Orchestra, and Hillman Opera, and teaches conducting and old-time music.

Dr. Schaad's tenure includes serving as music director of Asheville Symphony Youth Orchestras (NC) and Greenville County Youth Orchestras (SC) and orchestra director at Clemson University as well as South Carolina Governors School for the Arts and Humanities. She is a founder of Stringendo Orchestra School and Strawberry Hill Fiddlers (NY). She has taught elementary, middle, and high school strings in New York State and is active as a guest conductor, violist, educational consultant, and old-time fiddler.

Dr. Carrie Pawelski has been a music educator for over twenty years and has enjoyed working with students of all levels and ages throughout her career. She is the Director of Bands at Jefferson Middle School in her hometown of Jamestown, NY where she has created a thriving band program that has engaged hundreds of at-risk students. In 2017 she joined the faculty of the SUNY Fredonia School of Music to serve as the director of the Concert Band. In addition, she has led the middle and high school bands at the Fredonia Summer Music Festival and has served on the faculty for a variety of conducting symposiums. Dr. Pawelski has written multiple chapters in the Teaching Music Through Performance series, as well as a chapter in The Conductor's Companion. She has conducted honor bands throughout the states of Texas, Arkansas and New York.

A highlight of Dr. Pawelski's undergraduate experience at the Eastman School of Music was studying trombone with Dr. John Marcellus who, along with tremendous talent, was known for his humor and "joie de vivre." She brings a similar cheerful and spirited energy to her students, helping to make art music more accessible for players and audiences alike. This approach informed her doctoral research at Arizona State University, where she explored how to make music education more relevant by building community and a sense of belonging through social justice work.
