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# **Insight into Islam**

Maytum Convocation Lecturer to bridge information gap

Dr. Amer Ahmed, an acclaimed scholar who studies Islamic culture and has earned praise for his ability to facilitate honest, authentic dialogue that replaces fear and stereotypes with facts and understanding, will deliver the Maytum Convocation Lecture, "Islam: Beyond the Myths, Breaking Down the Barriers," on Tuesday, Sept. 12, 3 p.m., in King Concert Hall.

"Since 9-11, American questions and fears about Islam, its teachings and its followers, have grown," said Jennifer Hildebrand, Convocation Committee chair. "As the United States ponders how best to keep our citizens safe, the Convocation Committee believes that education must play a central role. If we have concerns about the teachings of Islam, an important step is to learn more about it."

The goal of Dr. Ahmed's talk, framed within the 2017-2018 Convocation theme. "Transformations." is to increase knowledge of Islam and provide needed context to bridge divides, Dr. Hildebrand explained. "As we continue to discuss and debate American policies, a fuller understanding of Muslim beliefs will help us to make informed decisions."

Tickets are required for the event, which is free and open to the public, and can be obtained at the Fredonia Ticket Office in the Williams Center.

Ahmed, also a Williams Visitina Professor, will participate in the campus' Professional Development Day sessions with faculty and students.

Islam's ascent to the forefront of the American consciousness was accompanied by fear and lack of understanding of one of the world's major religions, leading to confusion and conflict, Hildebrand explained. She points to a violent, hate-motivated attack on a Sikh temple near Milwaukee. Wis., to demonstrate that such misunderstandings create tragic problems not just for Muslim-Americans, but many others as well.

Ahmed is Director of Intercultural Teaching and Faculty Development at University of Massachusetts – Amherst, the flagship of the University of

Massachusetts system, with nearly 24.000 undergraduates and over 6,500 graduate

A Springfield, Ohio, native born to Indian Muslim immigrants, Ahmed has an eclectic personal and professional background. He has dedicated his life to engaging and facilitating diversity across human difference. He has a doctoral degree in Education from the University of South Dakota and has served as an intercultural diversity consultant, college administrator, facilitator, poet and hip hop activist. He has a M.A. and B.A., in Anthropology and Black Studies.

Ahmed is a nationally known speaker who addresses his diverse areas of expertise at colleges, conferences and institutes. He has appeared on MSNBC's "Melissa Harris-Perry" show and in "Cracking the Codes," a documentary film on racism.

According to a Pew Research Center estimate, Muslims are the fastest-growing religious group in the world, with 1.6 billion followers in 2010. Growth and regional migration of Muslims, along with the ongoing impact of the Islamic State (also known as ISIS or ISIL) and other extremist groups that represent a tiny minority of Muslims and commit acts of violence in the name of Islam, have placed Muslims and the Islamic faith at the forefront of political debate in the United States and other countries.

"Learning more about Islam should allow us to seek out connections and partnerships worldwide with those Muslims who also condemn terrorist acts, and it helps us to develop effective and creative solutions that protect the American people. A policy built on myths and falsehoods is unlikely to succeed," Hildebrand said.



# Making big waves in radio Fredonia Radio Systems crowned top collegiate station in U.S.

Systems is a relatively small player, a low-power outlet run entirely by students. But that doesn't mean SUNY's oldest radio station can't compete at the national level with larger, well-heeled collegiate broadcasters. In the vast college radio universe, Fredonia Radio

Fredonia Radio Systems (FRS) won the coveted Abraham & Borst Award at the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System's (IBS) 77th annual conference this past spring in New York City. Comprised of WDVL 89.5 and WCVF 88.9 FM, FRS went head-to-head with over 700 college and university radio stations of all sizes and came out on top based on quality of programming, service to the community, overall sound of the station, station management and operation and other criteria.

"The atmosphere in the station has pride written all over it. It's a great feeling to finally be recognized for all of the hard work we put into this station and we can't help but to take that in," beamed General Manager Rebecca "Becca" D'Hilly near the end of the spring semester. "I don't think anyone's stopped smiling since we got back from New York City."

WDVL, "Fredonia's Hit Radio Station," plays Top 40 music exclusively through the Internet, while sister station WCVF, "The Campus and Community Voice of Fredonia," offers varied programming heard throughout much of Chautaugua County. Both stations can be accessed on the Internet and iTunes Radio.

Just moments before winning the overall award, FRS was recognized as the "Best College Radio Station (Under 10,000 Students)." Guess there's no better warm-up to the ultimate prize.

Ms. D'Hilly was guardedly optimistic that FRS—already flush with a stable of individual trophy winners and the under 10,000 enrollment prize—was well-positioned to be given the very highest honor among stations likewise stocked with multiple student winners.

"I experienced everything from disbelief to unbelievable joy, and it wasn't until I called Dr. Laura Johnson, our faculty adviser, that the tears started streaming down my eyes," the graduating senior Communication/Public Relations major from West Seneca recalled.

There was a lot of hardware to cart back to McEwen Hall. Noah Maciejewski won a pair of awards: Best On-Air Personality for his weekly program, "Noah On-Air," and Best Use of Twitter for "@Noah\_onAir." Dan Salazar won Best Promotion Poster for his "80s Euphoria" poster. Alex Behrens won Best Use of Graphics in a Video for "Rockin' the Commons." The trio of Matt Pantano, Jaret Belschwinder and Jay Wilkie shared Best Hockey Play-by-Play honors.

Like the classic David vs. Goliath story, FRS was up

against radio stations endowed with large staffs and deep pockets. "When you have a small, low-power station at a smaller school, you don't think of yourself as possibly competing with major universities," admitted Dr. Johnson, a faculty member of the Department of Communication.

But FRS did just that, and Johnson was, without a doubt, "utterly amazed and unbelievably proud of them."

These staffers, described by Johnson as "a very hardworking cooperative," submitted more than 100 entries in various contest categories. "At last count it was 104 entries, and they sent more in after the deadline, and I think the judges were impressed, "Johnson exclaimed. "I have to give credit to Becky D'Hilly; she is a natural leader and a wonderful team builder. Her sister, Sarah, was GM a few years ago, so there is sort of that family thing going on."

Also named finalists were: Mr. Maciejewski, Best Celebrity Interviewer, for "Damn Daniel Interview;" Kris Harris, Best Radio Drama, "Mousepolcalypse;" Aidan Licker and Lexi Reyngoudt, Best Show Promotion, "Local Lo-down Static Promo;" Maddy Eberhardt and Maciejewski, Best Public Service, "Back to School Safety," and Harper Fischer, Best Logo, "Fredonia Radio Systems Logo."

What sets FRS apart from most college stations is the operational model Communication Professor Emeritus Dan Berggren developed early in his long station adviser tenure. "The 'Fredonia' model for a 'college radio station' gives freedom and responsibility to the students, allowing them to learn from decisions that are based in the 'real world'

> of broadcasting. It is a model that is not allowed at most colleges and universities," Johnson explained.

In fact, it was Mr. Berggren's unique model that attracted Johnson to Fredonia. "WCVF and WDVL are a living laboratory where students learn about the business of running radio stations and how to work creatively and productively in a professional environment," Johnson said. College administrations typically place paid personnel at some level above students.

The model has thrived at Fredonia because students are respectful of the responsibility that the administration has allowed them and they work very hard at their positions, Johnson added. They're guided by their heritage, their adviser, other faculty and staff, and very supportive alumni.

Longtime Communication Professor Ted Schwalbe commends Berggren for creating an atmosphere and culture of professionalism which students have maintained and passed on to others. "It wasn't just a college station to them; it was an FCC-licensed broadcast station with responsibilities to the community and the students always took that very seriously," Dr. Schwalbe said.

### **Best On-Air Personality**

Noah Maciejewski, a junior Audio/Radio Production and Video Production major, is razorfocused on a radio career as an on-air personality or in management. He won the Best On-Air Personality trophy for his weekly WDVL show, which features Top 40 music sprinkled with news about artists, celebrity gossip, concert announcements and campus news.

An internship at Entercom Radio in Buffalo led to an offer to join the on-air staff of Kiss 98.5 in a parttime/fill-in capacity on weekends. Maciejewski has also helped out at station events, handled board operations and even filled in at the front reception desk. He had the opportunity to work with former FRS personality Jud Heussler, '12, at Kiss 98.5. "He has been my mentor and has greatly helped me in

Maciejewski also won first place for Best Use of Twitter. He uses a separate Twitter account, "@Noah\_OnAir," to post content that's similar to what he features on his show. "I use it to promote events, share stories, funny things I find online. It's

really a great tool for interacting with my audience." Come this fall, Maciejewski, who joined FRS as a first-year student, will become General Manager. He previously served as an assistant before becoming WDVL Program Director. "It's a very exciting industry and I definitely want to continue being a part of it.'

Berggren picked up the baton from Dr. John Malcolm, the Department of Communication's founding father. He had worked at WCVF as a student in the 1950s, joined the faculty in 1963 and was instrumental in nurturing the radio station's growth in its "carrier current" era.

D'Hilly says Johnson watches over the operation and gives advice from her experiences that the staff is "unbelievably grateful" to receive. "She is the reason we have been able to grow and thrive as a station. Without the opportunities she has given us, we would have not been able to push ourselves this far to be the best we can be, which is apparently the Best Station in the Nation." D'Hilly said.

There's a strong connection between FRS and the Department of Communication, and a majority of its members are majors in the communication field, but nearly all academic concentrations are represented in the 174-student staff. Membership is open to all.

FRS also serves as a broadcast outlet for students enrolled in COMM 451, Audio Documentaries/Soundscapes, a senior capstone class for Audio/Radio Production majors. Each student has had his/her work broadcast on "High Noon Friday," WCVF's hour-long public affairs program.

The IBS conference, attended annually by FRS, delivers a comprehensive examination of the industry, with breakout sessions focused on programming, on-air content, budgeting, equipment and engineering, fundraising, management and public relations. Takeaways from this year's event also included branding, ways to expand awareness of the station on campus and surrounding areas, and increasing student involvement. Students also toured several New York stations and explored the city.

"Overall, I think we took home inspiration to try new things and the motivation to do so," D'Hilly said.

"I've been to the conference twice in my time at Fredonia Radio Systems and to this day my favorite session was 'Women in Media.' It was very empowering and different than any other session they had that weekend," D'Hilly noted.

### Humble beginnings in Old Main

FRS traces its roots to 1948 as a radio club that met on the third floor of Old Main, the Fredonia Normal School academic building on Temple Street, and produced programs that were broadcast on WDOE-AM, Dunkirk. The group moved to the new campus and WCVF-AM was formed. A transmitter located in the basement of each residence hall made it possible for the electrical system to carry the station's signal to any radio that was plugged into an electrical outlet. Once an extension of the Department of English and Drama, WCVF-AM became entirely student-run in 1966.

As Fredonia's modern campus grew, the station was shuttled among buildings, including the second-floor of Fenton Hall, basement of Jewett Hall, the press box in the Dods Hall gymnasium and in Gregory Hall, before the second floor of McEwen Hall became its permanent home.

WCVF-FM 88.9 was born Sept. 25, 1978, initially with 10 watts of broadcast power. Now at 150 watts, it has a potential audience of 40,000 people in Northern Chautauqua County. WCVF-600 AM switched to WDVL Cable 89.5, and the two stations became Fredonia Radio Systems.

### Low power doesn't mean you're off the radar

Back in 2011, Fredonia Radio Systems had top billing over stations at several highly regarded universities in a lengthy New York Times article, "College Radio Heads: Off the Dial," that examined how college stations around the country were transforming themselves into multimedia platforms to remain relevant to tech-savvy students. The reporter wound up spending an entire day at FRS, Johnson recalled, and Jud Heussler, FRS's general manager at the time, was quoted early, often and quite extensively.

In fact, the story began by conveying what takes place inside a FRS broadcast booth, as Mr. Heussler presides over the hourlong comedy show "The Morning Inferno" and gives a heads-up to listeners for what he'd soon be throwing up on the show's Facebook page. Input from program directors Izzy Jay (WCVF)

and Rob Neves (WDVL) also ran in the story.

Johnson attributes Fredonia's dominant presence in the *Times'* dissertation, in part, to Heussler's engaging personality. "I remember that the reporter found herself laughing at Jud's jokes while he was on the air and she told him that he was truly funny. I think his leadership led to an outstanding result for the station. We were fortunate to be mentioned in that article, as a small, low-power station."

Radio stations at Yale, Vanderbilt, Brown, Cornell, DePaul, Drexel and Princeton were also represented in the article.

### The best yet to be heard

So will FRS staffers start to relax on their laurels? Not a chance, D'Hilly insists.

"I think our standards for everything are a little bit higher now, which is a good thing! We want to continue this growth and success of the station so we are all taking on our projects with a little more creativity and innovation. People are thinking outside the box and taking the risks that you should be taking at a college radio station, when it's fun and experimental."

Groundwork for today's accolades was set by generations of students who nurtured FRS. Many former staffers have pursued successful careers in the industry and more than 50 IBS trophies have been awarded to students over the years.

"It's all the little details that laid the foundation for something like this to happen—for FRS to be recognized as best college station," Berggren said. "It took years and years of dedicated students creating, revising and implementing unglamorous but necessary documents like station constitution, policies and standard operating procedures. This provides the system in which members can be creative, and the reminder to always serve listeners. The challenge is accomplishing this with forward momentum as each year new staff members join and others graduate and leave."

What can college radio do best?

"It can be part of the liberal arts concept where learning never stops, where diversity is celebrated, and where your education doesn't teach you all the answers, or make you think you have all the answers, but teaches you to ask the right questions," Berggren said

FRS staffers are also working on a documentary to commemorate the approaching 40th anniversary of WCVF-FM.

"That will be a big day," Johnson promised.

### 'Best Hockey Play-by-Play

Three's definitely not a crowd in a live Blue Devils hockey broadcast.

"It's a real team effort," says Jay Wilkie, one-third of the team honored for delivering the Best Hockey Play by Play. Jared Belschwinder and Mr. Wilkie, a midseason recruit, rotate between delivering play-by-play and commentary during each period of play, while Matt Pantano handles board operator duties.

"We all work together to make the game go as smooth as possible," said Wilkie, a senior Childhood Inclusive Education/

English major.

"If somehow this award led me to be able to do play-by-play for the Buffalo Sabres one day, then I would do that in a heartbeat," Wilkie joked. "However, I have a passion for education and plan to pursue a career in the field post-graduation."

Mr. Belschwinder got involved in FRS as an assistant to the News Director in his first year at Fredonia and rose to Sports Director in 2016–2017.

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### 'Best Promotional Poster'

Dan Salazar, a sophomore Animation and Illustration major, won "Best Promotional Poster" for art work that helped launch the revival of "80s Euphoria," a celebration of 1980s music that FRS carried into the early 2000s.

"The hosts of '80s Euphoria' gave me an inspiration sheet with references for the hairstyles and outfits they wanted on the poster, as well as a general idea of the aesthetic. I had a lot of fun capturing the '80s illustration look," Mr. Salazar explained. "The little touches of 3D text and the slightly grainy overlay were my favorite elements to play with."





Originally from Buffalo, N.Y., Mrs. Williams resides in Westchester County. 

### Writing herself a bright future

Keah Brown's fate was sealed as a teenager when she got lost; in words, in characters and in stories.

"I first knew I wanted to be a writer in high school," Keah Brown said. "I always loved reading about people and things I could identify with or love to hate."

It was that passion for stories, along with a naturally inquisitive personality, that led her from Fredonia to her career as an entertainment writer. Ms. Brown, a 2013 graduate with a major in Journalism and a minor in Creative Writing, is currently a Senior Entertainment Writer at Cliché Magazine, where she writes TV and movie reviews and interviews celebrities about their shows and lives, including notables such as Tia Mowry, Justin Baldoni and Keith Powers. "I've been very fortunate to have people open up to me about their character, and what they're like off-camera," Brown said.

But her writing doesn't stop there. "I get to write articles about shows I love and interview those actors during the day, and then at night I write essays," Brown said. "I'm doing two things I love and thought I would not get to do, and I'm speaking to literary agents who want me to sign with them."

Brown has had her essays published in ESPNW, Lenny Letter, *Essence*, Catapult, and Literary Hub, to name a few. She just finished a piece for *Essence* magazine. "They (literary agents) want to eventually publish a book of mine. I'm doing things that far surpass anything I thought I could do. It feels magical, really, because I get to share pieces of myself, and pieces of other people."

Her talents for sharing those stories were nurtured at Fredonia, and Brown credits her professors with supplying her two valuable things; feedback and encouragement. "The professors at Fredonia really get to know you. You're not just another face in the crowd. They want to know about you and what you love, and what you want to do with your life."

Brown's development as a writer also took shape outside traditional journalism classes. "I took a Greek myth class and a creative writing class, and they helped me in ways I couldn't have imagined," she said. "They were instrumental in helping me become the writer I am today."

Ironically, Brown's professors say she is the one who inspires. "When other people may have given up on their dreams, I've seen her persevere and keep going through major obstacles," said Associate Professor Elmer Ploetz of the Department of Communication.

The obstacles were not trivial, but Brown made sure they were not a barrier to her dreams. Brown was born with what she describes as a mild case of cerebral palsy. "It took me awhile to get to a place where I was okay with it," she recalled.

She credits the inclusionary spirit at Fredonia for helping her. "I spent a lot of my high school years embarrassed about it, and then I got to Fredonia and nobody cared. So I realized this is the body I was given and I'm just going to roll with the punches."

Brown did more than just accept her situation. She embraced it and, in the process, inspired others across social media. She started a hashtag on Twitter—#disabledandcute—that went viral this past spring. "I started it with a bunch of pictures and had people with disabilities

share pictures of themselves and talk about why they love themselves," Brown said. She was interviewed about the social media push in almost a dozen countries around the world.

"I wish I could bottle that drive and give it to other students, but it's something that's pure Keah," Mr. Ploetz said.

Brown brought that drive and spirit back to her alma mater last April, when she was a guest speaker as part of Fredonia's "Writers@Work" series. She told current students to have faith in their future. "I told them that sometimes success or a job doesn't happen overnight. But if you keep working hard and believe in what you're doing, it will happen when it's time."

So by working hard, Brown has proven that getting lost really can help you find your way.

### Science graduate helps to conquer a global problem

A Fredonia alumnus, now a graduate student at Virginia Tech, has been awarded a fellowship to investigate a virus responsible for significant economic losses in the swine industry.

Nicholas Catanzaro, of Lewiston, N.Y., completed a bachelor's degree in Molecular Genetics at Fredonia in 2013. He first visited Virginia Tech during the summer of 2012 to participate in Research Experiences for Undergraduates, a 10-week summer program that introduced him to microbiology research at the university.

Mr. Catanzaro credited his undergraduate professors at Fredonia with preparing him for the next step in his studies. "Through integrative and engaging experiences in both the classroom and lab, I learned valuable skills and techniques that allowed me to hit the ground running upon starting my dissertation research," Catanzaro said. "However, it was the environment and culture at Fredonia, especially within the Biology department, that prepared me the most. The people

around me, both my peers and professors, made science exciting and motivated me to learn."

Catanzaro, a Ph.D. student in the Virginia Tech Department of Biomedical Sciences and Pathobiology, hopes his research on porcine reproductive and respiratory syndrome virus (PRRSV) will eventually help scientists develop safer, better vaccines. He was recently awarded a two-year, \$95,000 fellowship from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Institute of Food and Agriculture for his research.

"This is one of the most economically devastating global swine pathogens and causes more than \$600 million in economic losses in the United States alone each year," Catanzaro said. "My fellowship looks at how the virus causes disease in pigs. That's important because scientists are trying to make safer, more-effective vaccines for pigs against the virus."

First discovered in 1987, PRRSV causes reproductive failures in pregnant

sows and respiratory disease in young piglets. Although it has similarities to the Coronaviridae family of viruses, which include the deadly severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), it cannot spread from animals to humans and poses no food safety threat.

Catanzaro's interest in research peaked during his time at Fredonia, he said. "During my junior and senior years at Fredonia, I worked on an undergraduate research project with Dr. Theodore Lee," Cantanzaro said. "We were interested in microbial communities involved in a unique geological process along the banks of Canadaway Creek. This research experience allowed me to apply the skills and techniques discussed in the classroom to a real world problem. In working with Dr. Lee, I realized research was something I enjoyed and would like to pursue as a career."

Thanks to his Fredonia undergraduate degree, Catanzaro is able to do just that.

The administration worked for this recognition, but the driving force has always been the hardworking faculty in all departments," said Dr. Russell Boisjoly, School of Business faculty member and Dean of the School of Business from 2009 to 2017. "The business commitment with our community has also been vital to reaching this goal."

Fredonia's commitment starts with engagement. Students take their studies out of the classroom and work with outside businesses and clients to work and problem-solve on all facets of the business world, from marketing, to operations, to finance. All business students are required to take an internship in their field.

During the 2015-2016 academic year, Fredonia business students participated in 213 internships for local and regional organizations. Faculty and students conducted 470 projects with individuals, companies and organizations. Faculty also contributed over 90 different volunteer

to a "live" business problem (students) or witness the "best way" to carry out project work within a course with multiple teams for a company (faculty).

Fredonia is constantly examining its course load strategically to ensure classes are aligned with what industries are looking for in future employees. The business student organization, Enactus, is among the top campus groups in the country. Fredonia graduates have entered into highly-competitive positions in companies like Geico, Frito-Lay, ADP, and Wal-Mart, to name just a few.

"Quality business education is critical to developing the next generation of leaders, and I commend Fredonia for its dedication, as well as its leadership in the community," said Reid. "Through accreditation, the Fredonia School of Business has not only met rigorous standards of excellence, but has also made an external commitment to ongoing improvement to ensure that they will continue to innovate and deliver the value promised to their students."

Van Schoonhoven, originally from Lockport, was a first-year Adler Fellowship recipient with the San Francisco Opera this past year, and will make his San Francisco debut in the fall in Strauss' "Electra" as Young Servant. He recently received the 2017 Nicolai Gedda Memorial Award from the George London Foundation and was a finalist in the 2016 Jensen Foundation Vocal Competition. He also participated in the Merola Opera Program in 2016, and debuted with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra in July at Kleinhans Music Fall at its 2017 Donor and Subscriber Appreciation Concert.

Following his Fredonia years, during which he studied with the late Delia Wallis and Dr. Gerald Gray, van Schoonhoven earned a Master of Music degree from Westminster Choir College. Dr. Gray noted, "Kyle van Schoonhoven is quickly rising to the top ranks of operatic tenors. He is uniquely poised to become one of, if not the great Wagnerian tenor of his generation. And to be sure, true Wagnerian tenors are rare. One could argue that the world has been waiting for the next one for some time. I am so proud of Kyle for his musical, vocal and personal success, and for the humility and gratitude he has shown throughout his journey to the top. And, I am most grateful to have had some small influence on shaping a talent that will bring joy and richness to so many lives."

Fredonia's additional connection to

the Finals competition is alumna Barbara Kilduff-O'Farrell, '81, who was a Winner in the Finals in 1986 with Luciano Pavarotti and Placido Domingo as judges. She also won the Munich and Tchaikovsky competitions the same year. She went on to an exciting career, singing in the most famous opera houses in the world, including Lincoln Center, where she made her debut with the Metropolitan Opera as Zerbinetta in "Ariadne auf Naxos." She will be a featured performer at this fall's Hillman Opera 60th Anniversary Alumni Concert.

Some of the best known singers in opera have participated in the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions including Ms. Fleming, Susan Graham, Thomas Hampson, Stephanie Blythe, Eric Owens, Patricia Racette, Deborah Voigt, Angela Meade and Frederica von Stade.

# Finance graduate switches careers, launches Chicago non-profit to benefit youth

In Chicago, more than 500 miles from his alma mater, Justin Cunningham, '15, is guiding a non-profit organization that he and a few childhood friends launched last year to empower youth through the arts, education and civic engagement.

That's a tall order in a troubled American city, but SocialWorks—with a fast-rising hip-hop star on board—is tackling that laudable goal.

Mr. Cunningham teamed up with GRAMMY Award-winning artist Chance the Rapper—he was Chancelor Bennett in the third grade classroom they shared on Chicago's South Side—and Essence Smith, a high school classmate, to create SocialWorks.

"We got together to form SocialWorks because we've always been looking to enhance opportunity and provide access to those without," explained Cunningham, its executive director. "This is something we all felt we must take part in, especially this extraordinary opportunity to leverage Chano's celebrity and make being a good person cool again."

Also on board as a founder is Ken Bennett, who brings considerable political and social work experience to the fledgling organization. Mr. Bennett served three Chicago mayors, was a campaign manager for President Barack Obama during his U.S. Senate run and was a deputy officer in the Obama presidency. He's also Chance's father.

Being able to impact the community is what steered Cunningham, who earned a degree in Finance and a minor in Leadership Studies, away from corporate work. Cunningham held administrative positions with a nationwide food-service and facilities management firm, a major convention center and Chicago Public Schools.

SocialWorks' roots go back to early 2015 with monthly "OpenMike" sessions that provided safe spaces for high school students to express themselves and also learn and network with like-minded individuals. Through the Warmest Winter, an initiative with The Empowerment Plan that hires homeless individuals to make coats that can be transformed into sleeping bags, SocialWorks raised over \$110,000 and gave over 1,100 coats to homeless individuals and shelters.

SocialWorks hooked up with Chicago non-profits in last fall's Flex Your Vote

campaign to facilitate millennial voter activation, education, demonstration and celebration. Pop-up registration shops and town hall gatherings set the stage for a free concert in the city's Grant Park and Parade to the Polls. Over 2,000 people—including about 750 first-time voters—marched to the polls to exercise their early-voting option.

The organization's logo conveys a universal message of community, progression and positivity, Cunningham explained. All figures are placed close together, raising objects associated with particular fields—photography, science, music and art. They are raised in a fun, liberating fashion within the hands of diverse groups of people.

Cunningham longed to have a positive influence in his hometown with his family and friends. "I believe everything is more clear in civic work, meaning you know who you are impacting and why," explained Cunningham.

It was Cunningham's tenure in Enactus, a student organization at Fredonia committed to projects that have a social, economic or environmental impact in the community, which fueled the SocialWorks vision.

"What inspired me to get involved with SocialWorks was my experience with Fredonia's Enactus. I'm essentially doing the same work," Cunningham said. "Fredonia Enactus allowed me the opportunity to be a part of something bigger than myself. Enactus is all about creating programming and infrastructure



that provides impact on a continual basis and alters the community to ultimately change the world."

School of Business Assistant Professor Susan McNamara said Cunningham, a former SUNY Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence nominee, had the rare ability to integrate his academic learning with his experiential and extra-curricular experiences.

Fredonia instilled in Cunningham a "sense of community" that he wasn't accustomed to while growing up. "I try to acknowledge everyone and build a relationship. Meghan Bartlett (Johnstown, N.Y.) and Arron Carlson (LeRoy, N.Y.) earned several post-season honors – including two All-America certificates each last March at the NCAA Division III Swimming & Diving championships in Shenandoah, Texas.

Bartlett, a six-time All-America, was named SUNYAC Diver of the Meet for the second time and Female Diver of The Year for the third straight season. She also won the SUNYAC Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award.

Carlson, owner of seven All-America certificates (including honorable mentions), was SUNYAC Diver of the Meet for the second straight year and SUNYAC Male Diver of the Year for the first time. He also received SUNYAC's James Fulton Award, an annual men's swimming and diving award recognizing athletic, academic and lifetime achievement.

Prior to graduating in May, Bartlett and Carlson each won their second Fredonia Athletes of the Year awards as voted upon by the Athletics Department and announced at the Student-Athlete Gala on May 7. They are the first back-to-back winners under the new awards format.

Fredonia's string of NCAA contestants

dates back to 2006 when Kelly (Sponholz) Neth—a 2016 Fredonia Athletics Hall of Fame inductee—won her first of eight straight SUNYAC championships and All-America awards, including the 2009 NCAA Division III 3-meter springboard title as a senior.

Since then, 12 Blue Devil divers have combined for 46 All-America awards—at least one in every year. It was that history of success which led Bartlett to Fredonia's door—after a stop for one year at NCAA Division I St. Bonaventure. She transferred to Fredonia as a sophomore.

"I knew that Coach (John) Crawford had built up a strong community and the team was really close," she said. "So if I was going to transfer out of a Division I program, I knew it had to be to the best Division III program around."

Crawford, the former Fredonia head coach who returned as an assistant when the program returned in the early 2000s, had recruited Bartlett at Johnstown (N.Y.) High School, so she was familiar with the school and the program. What surprised her was the level of diving talent Crawford had amassed.

"To be honest," she said, "I was amazed at how good they were. They were throwing 2 ½ flips off the 1-meter board. That was better than what most Division

I divers could do. That's not to say there weren't good divers at Division I, but I mostly only saw them at the championship meet. Compared to Division I, Division III was a lot better overall, the competition more fierce, the level of the diving a lot higher."

Carlson's "a-ha!" moment came during the second week of practice during his first year. He had just performed a very basic dive off the 3-meter board—a dive that eventually became so simple, he stopped doing it at meets.

"I remember getting out of the water and thinking 'Hey, that wasn't hard or scary. This shouldn't be too bad," "he said. "After that things got progressively easier and easier...I was having fun trying to learn harder stuff rather than being scared trying to learn harder stuff."

It also made him realize if he put his faith in his coach, the sky was the limit.

"For two weeks," Carlson said, "we basically did nothing but basic skills. I had no idea what these basic skills were. I was re-learning from the ground up everything I knew about the sport, which was encouraging, because it meant I wasn't going to have to work so hard mentally. I just had to listen and do everything physically to be better."

# Honoring 44 years of service to Athletics

While he retired as Fredonia's Athletic Director this summer, Greg Prechtl won't be going far. He has been named Athletic Director Emeritus and will remain active in the Blue Devil Booster Club and the Fredonia Athletics Hall of Fame Committee.

"They said they would find me a small office somewhere on campus," Prechtl said. "I want to stay involved, to have some place to go to."

Including his four years as a student, Prechtl has been coming to campus since the fall of 1965. During 44 years of employment, his jobs have included Residence Director at Alumni Hall, Head Men's Basketball Coach and Athletic Director. Perhaps his great achievement was meeting his future wife, Linda, while both were Fredonia students. They have three children and three grandchildren.

Well-wishers have included former players, opponents, and work colleagues.

"I still remember my dad and I meeting you for the first time," wrote John Fischetti, a former player and Hall of Fame point guard. "On my way home my father strongly suggested FSU and I had to admit he was right. You know how hard it is to admit your father is right when you are 17."

"I didn't like you very much my early years in Fredonia," wrote Kevin Donovan, another former player. "Over the years, I've grown to love you like a family member. It was my blessing to have you in my life ... I appreciate your kindness and true love for

your players and all others associated with Fredonia Athletics."

Wrote former SUNY Buffalo State men's basketball coach Dick Bihr: "You carried on a great tradition in Intercollegiate Athletics at Fredonia and in the SUNYAC (and) I knew you always acted in the best interest of your student-athletes and the game both of us cared so much about."

"I feel fortunate indeed to have had a chance to work with you," wrote Dr. Don Wesley, a former colleague at Gowanda Central School, where Prechtl spent one year teaching high school English. "As you enter retirement, I know you will continue to matter in the lives of others."

Prechtl said he was "overwhelmed by the nice things people have said."

"Apparently they are very forgiving or very forgetful," he joked. "I probably wasn't the easiest guy to play for when I was coaching. But I think most of the guys who played for me knew that while I could be very demanding, I cared for them a lot.

"I liked my job as an Athletic Director and made quite a few friends across the state. But my love always was in coaching. That's because I was able to work with student-athletes...I liked the kids who played for me and felt that almost every night they gave me a good effort. The people who were on my staff were great people to work with."

Vice President of Enrollment and Student Services Cedric Howard noted the campus has set up the Greg & Linda




# Birger Vanwesenbeeck invited to give Magliocco Lecture
